
May we also take this opportunity to ask you to remind us of any special needs you may have, as well as letting us know if any of the ladies would like to assist part time as a childminder on the

STEAM RAILWAY NEWS

Sandstone's GMAM 4079 pulls three water tankers out of Magaliesburg, primarily due to the lack of watering facilities for steam locomotion in the 21st Century.

A TANKER ON THE TAIL

Although the Garratt locomotive was one of the most successful designs of the steam era, it had one drawback which was the diminishing adhesion factor as water was used up in the front and rear tanks. This reduction in weight over the driving axles led to a lowered adhesion of the driving wheels. When in operation for shunting, this was not a major issue as there was always a water column nearby. On longer runs, this could be problematic, especially on steeply graded sections. As Garratt locomotives generally had a smaller water capacity than a conventional engine, most locomotives often trailed an auxiliary water tank behind the loco. This had the effect of increasing the water capacity and keeping the water in the front and rear tanks constantly replenished as water was required. On main line locomotives, such as the GMA/M, it also allowed adjustments to coal and water capacity to vary the axle load of the engine for use on lighter-laid rail.

Sandstone's new NGG11 No 52 will be seen in operation with water tanker X2197, which has been specially refurbished by Lukas Nel and his Bloemfontein team to be semi permanently attached to No 52. This will enable the loco to operate longer distances without watering and ensure better adhesion on Sandstone's steeply graded system.

Being a small loco, No 52 has quite a small water capacity, with 4410 litres in the front tank and 1730 litres in the rear, together with 2 tons of coal. Tanker X2197 will add 14460 litres to the capacity. In contrast, an NGG16 has up to 6200 litres in the front tank and up to 2450 litres in the rear tank, a significant difference in adhesive weight.

The tanker has now been moved to Sandstone from Bloemfontein, along with NGG11 No 52, which was steam tested in the last few days and put through its commissioning trials as our pictures show.

So when you see No 52, watch out for the tanker on the tail!


A NEW HEART FOR LAWLEY NG97

Following on from our last Newsletter, work on the boiler of Lawley NG97 is progressing with a target date of mid-February for its return to Sandstone.

Keith Stevens has now begun work on the new inner firebox and sent us this picture gallery of the work in progress.

"We are now assembling the new firebox after much fitting and bending and getting everything correct. We are hoping to get the firebox riveted up at the weekend and then we will fit it to the boiler and drill and tap the stay holes, of which there are 166", he reports.

We look forward to seeing NG97 back in steam for *Stars of Sandstone 2017*.

OUR PEOPLE... WHO MAKE IT ALL HAPPEN

Building a railway, maintaining a railway and operating a railway is hard, physical work. Give a thought to our Track Maintenance Crews who, in this case, are building a section of a brand-new railway.

Apart from the never-ending task of maintaining nearly 30km of Narrow Gauge railway, they must also build the new Children's Railway, itself another 3km long.

We have just recently received permission from the South African Rail Safety Regulator to build the new rail infrastructure, so we have our work cut out for us to meet the *Stars of Sandstone 2017* deadline.

91 010 - THE USA CONNECTION

One of the amazing facts about the railway preservation community is the worldwide connections that are made, and the assistance and advice that is forthcoming from all parts of the world. While the locomotives differ greatly all over the globe, the spirt of cooperation is unrivalled. As the years progress, diesel locomotives are an increasing part of preservation and Sandstone has the only two large diesels in preservation in South Africa, being 2ft Gauge No 91 010 and Cape Gauge NRZ DE2 No 1207, although a number of operators have small shunting diesel locos.

The recent acquisition of 91 010 has brought a new perspective to our loco workshop, and although we have competent staff, with the technology, the approach is very different. In fact, a friend of Sandstone in the UK has warned that diesels can be much more "fun" than steam

Help is at hand though, and we have had help from two local operators in South Africa, but also from Robert Carter in the USA.

Robert is a career railwayman, originally from the UK, on the electrical and engineering side.

Railways including 8 years at the Railway Technical centre in Derby. Since then he has spent the last 30 years in the USA working on railway projects including overseas assignments in Taiwan, Korea and France. He has a South African connection by being involved in the design and implementation of computer controlled air brake and vacuum brake systems for Transnet Freight Rail's class 37 and 39 locomotives.

He has also volunteered on the Ffestiniog Railway in Wales, restored a 1944 Sunbeam Trolleybus and now maintains a fleet of 6 tractors at his farm.

Robertbegan his career working for British

With his strong connections to General Electric in the USA, the builders of 91-010, Robert has been able to source important literature for 91-010 which will assist in its refurbishment as well as important information for the CAT diesel engine.

Robert has been actively promoting our Stars event in the USA and we hope to see him at Stars of Sandstone 2017. Thank you Robert from all at Sandstone for your kind help and assistance.

STARS OF SANDSTONE 2017: LECTURES

It is customary to take the opportunity to ask specialists in the various categories of equipment in operation at Sandstone to explain a lot more about what they do and the background to their speciality.

The Armour Museum in Bloemfontein is particularly good at this, and Major Jean-Pierre Scherman (School of Armour) will once again be talking about Military matters. He has sent us the following update:

It is my intention to present during this year's Stars of Sandstone event, two lectures making use of two separate 10x10m terrain relief models (sand model). This will allow significantly more interaction between me as the presenter and my audience. The two topics that I have identified as being historically significant are:

- 1). The Battle between the United Nations Force Intervention Brigade [UN FIB] (which included a South African Infantry Battalion, Paratrooper Company, Special Forces soldiers and later Rooivalk Combat Support Helicopters) and the M-23 Rebel Group, over the period 23 August to 04 November 2013 in and around the city of Goma, North Kivu Province, DRC.
- 2). The Battle between the SANDF Protection Team (comprising Paratrooper Company, Special Forces Detachments and other attached elements) and the Seleka Rebel Group over the period 22 to 24 March 2013, in and around the Capital City of the Central African Republic, Bangui.

Furthermore, in the evenings (as time and programme allows) lectures on any of the following topics:

- The SANDF in the DRC.
- The SANDF in Darfur, Sudan.
- The SANDF and Operation Boleas (Lesotho).
- The SANDF in the Ivory Coast.
- The War in Syria.
- The War in the Ukraine.

Major Jean-Pierre Scherman will present these informative lectures on the following Stars of Sandstone 2017 dates: Tuesday 4 and Saturday 8 April 2017.

The Military Vehicle Displays, Demonstrations, and Convoys organised by the Armour Museum in Bloemfontein in association with the Sandstone Heritage Trust at the Stars events are becoming ever more popular. We are also receiving calls from people who used to drive these sorts of vehicles during the Angolan Military Sadly, WW2 Veterans who experienced engagement etc. Marmon-Herringtons, Sherman Tanks, CMP trucks and other famous Military items from that era have now passed on, but the image of these machines remains strong in the minds of many people. If you have never seen a Sherman tank in operation, you need to attend this show. Our Sherman will be joined by a number of very exciting Military machines from the Armour Museum, and of course will be complemented by our own vehicles, which include a Ratel, Casspir, Samil, Buffel, Moffel and many others.

The focus of the Military Vehicle collection at Sandstone is of particular vehicles in which South African soldiers fought and sometimes died. During our period of isolation brought on by international sanctions, South Africa built up a formidable Military Vehicle and Weapons industry, which still thrives today. All the vehicles mentioned in the last sentence of the paragraph above were developed and built in this country and the Casspir, which went into production 37 years ago, is still looked on as the leader in its field.

STOP PRESS

The Armour Museum has arranged to add a number of vehicles to our cooperative agreement. One of these is a rare experimental Ratel Log (for Logistic) 8-wheel transport vehicle, of which only two were ever made. Naturally, much work will be required to bring them up to scratch! More on this and other special vehicles in the next newsletter.

SANDSTONE CATTLE

A new development is the creation of an Afrikaner cattle family unit. A mixed group of bulls, cows, oxen (young and old), heifers and calves has been established.

In a modern beef farming unit the cattle are separated and bulls are only introduced at specific times of the year. Going back 100-years or more farmers didn't do that. The cattle existed as a family unit where everybody was housed together.

The bulls never left the cows and the heifers were served when nature felt it was time for that to happen. The full Afrikaner unit comprising more than 80 cattle will be in and around the complex throughout Stars of Sandstone 2017.



WILDLIFE MATTERS

We have a policy at Sandstone Estates of allowing game to roam free. Unfortunately, the drawback is that our neighbours see this as an opportunity to hunt. As a result, the wild Springbok have migrated much closer to our complex. These animals found us, none were purchased and none have ever been fenced in. They choose to be with us of their own free will.

Last year we spotted a white Springbok and now we have four of them, which is quite remarkable; there are obviously some rare genetics in our herd. They are a glorious sight to observe from the train, but naturally they appear whenever they feel like it.



ADOPT A MACHINE



CALLING ALL VOLUNTEERS

We are pleased with the response from volunteers and we now have an increasing number of competent people who will be assisting us during the Stars of Sandstone 2017 event. This includes a strong contingent from the South African Vintage Tractor & Engine Club (SAVTEC), together with a number of independent volunteers.

We have also got a strong commitment from visitors from the UK and Australia in particular to assist us. The problem is that they cannot be expected to bring their tools with them. We obviously can purchase tools but it means that these tools become surplus to our requirements after the event. We would therefore ask all South African volunteers to please try and bring their own tools with them. There will be secure facilities to lock them up in during the event.

As far as foreign volunteers are concerned, we have a small budget to purchase some tools which will be made available to them but on the basis that they are issued with the tools when they start and they will be recovered when they leave. In other words, it will not be a free-for-all.

Any comments or thoughts that people might have on this would be appreciated. One should remember that Sandstone's events are very much a community project, in the sense that a lot of the people who come as visitors actually become participants, which enables us to expand the scope of what we are able to present to the public. This is a win-win situation because the people who are doing it enjoy it and the people who see it enjoy it.


